
2024 Historic Preservation Award Winners

A Walk Through the City...

Recently a patron asked MVHS if we could provide city directory entries for the families of Goeppinger and Resch, particularly looking for information on businesses either had owned within the city up to and including 1900. The patron knew some information to get started. Jacob Resch and his wife Mary, nee: Goeppinger, lived in Berlin Center, Ohio around 1860, later moving to Canfield.

The 1882-1883 city directory was the first listing for Jacob Resch, in partnership with John Goeppinger, his brother-in-law, as Goeppinger & Resch, leather, findings (i.e.: metal claps, rings, etc.), boot and shoe upper manufacturers, located at 71 West Federal Street. At that time Jacob Resch resided in Canfield. Goeppinger resided on High Street.

By the 1883-1884 directory, Goeppinger & Resch had moved to their long-time address of 221 West Federal Street. In 1884-1885 the firm became known as Resch & Sons dealing in leather and shoe findings. At that time John G. Goeppinger was listed as a stock dealer.

1886-1887 Goeppinger's trade was a dealer in tallow and grease. J. Resch & Sons took on the wholesale and retail sales of leather and shoe findings, leather belting, etc.

Goeppinger listed himself as a dealer in hides, pelts, furs, tallow etc. located at 277 West Federal Street in 1888-1889. J. Resch & Sons actually advertised in this directory for the first time. Their advertisement, which ran in the following directory for 1889-1890, shoed the integral business connection between the family members of Goeppinger and Resch continuing. At this time Jacob Resch and his sons, John J. and Frank J., made up the firm. Another son Albert G. Resch joined the company in 1893-1894 serving as a clerk.

The 1897 directory showed that John Goeppinger was a manufacturer of "high grade laundry and toilet soap" while continuing to deal in hides, pelts, tallow, wool, etc. This business took on the name Youngstown Soap Company by 1898's listing.

Statement from the 1940s

J. Resch & Sons continued to serve from their 221 West Federal Street location until after Jacob Resch's death in December 1901. Around 1902 the firm incorporated as J. Resch Sons Co., headed by John Justus Resch who served as president of the firm until his death in 1917.

By the 1940s, the company specialized in fine luggage and athletic goods as evidenced by this original statement found in the collections of MVHS. The firm ceased to exist some time after 1947's listing. The 1949-1950 directory shows Livingston's at the 221-229 West Federal Street location.

This is Youngstown: The Hispanic People of the City

Youngstown photographer Tony Nicholas has been a successful working artist for the past 20 years. Nicholas has had his work shown at museums throughout the Midwest and Eastern U.S., including Tyler History Center. In 2015, Nicholas joined Chris Yambar and Janet Macoska for the exhibit *Rock Gods: The Art of Rock 'n' Roll Photography*, which filled Tyler's first floor galleries with iconic images of live music performances.

Nicholas returns to Tyler History Center this September with a photo-documentary project highlighting local Hispanic people and culture. The exhibit, *This is Youngstown: The Hispanic People of the City*, will feature thirty-five photo portraits and biographies of a range of people from Youngstown's Hispanic community including everyday people of all ages, blue-collar workers, business owners, professionals, and academics.

For Nicholas, who has captured a myriad of subjects, this celebration of the Hispanic people of his home city can do many positive things within the community and beyond. The exhibit will illuminate our inherent similarities, an important effort in the current divisive climate. It will serve as a cultural documentary of the people who make this city what it is in this moment in time. This project will celebrate the grit, determination, innovation, and longevity of Youngstown's Hispanic Community, qualities that the city's whole population have in common.

The exhibit will open to the public Saturday, September, 7, and remain open through January, 2025 at Tyler History Center's Youngstown Foundation Community History Gallery.



This July, Youngstown artist Maple Turner III is bringing twenty-two new artworks to Arms Family Museum. The exhibit will feature paintings of the Gilded Age homes, carriages, and residents of Youngstown's Wick Avenue and Crandall Park neighborhoods. It will also include scenes from New York City, where Turner lived from 1999-2005. These two settings influenced Turner's development as a young artist at East High School and Youngstown State University, and as he continued his post-graduate education in New York. Finding Gold at an Auction

Youngstown resident, David J. Tacsik, stumbled upon an unexpected treasure when purchasing transcription disks at a local auction. After collecting his purchase, he noticed that there were WKBN labels on them. He decided to bring the disks to Stewart Media Archives Center in March, and the staff uncovered their special nature.

Transcription disks are sixteen inches in diameter, and were used by WKBN and other stations to record audio to a record disk for the purpose of playing at another time. The Stewart Media Archives Center has approximately 900 transcription disks in its collection. The disks brought to us from Mr. Tacsik add a whole new dimension to our collection. They cover the time between September 1945 through January 1946, and the content is centered around sports in the valley. The shipping box that the disks came in was addressed to Richard Siman, of San Francisco, California. The connection between Richard Siman and WKBN is unclear, but we believe Siman attended Wilson High School







before he joined the Navy during World War II, and someone at WKBN wanted him to have the ability to hear the broadcasts of the Wilson High football games while he was away. Six sets of the disks were transcriptions of Wilson High School football games verses South, Chaney, Boardman, Rayen, East and Ursuline high schools. The play-by-play commentary was from long time WKBN sportscaster, Don Gardner, and his live broadcasts of the games were recorded in the studio.

A separate set of disks was recorded in January 1946 of the Youngstown Bears versus the Chicago American Gears. The Bears and the Gears were two teams in the National Basketball League that was founded in 1937. The Bears played for two seasons before folding in 1947. The N.B.L merged with another league to form the National Basketball Association (N.B.A.). The National Basketball League was notable because of the opportunities for African-American players to compete in games with White players during and after World War II. Each of these recordings are unique and hold a special place in the history of the Mahoning Valley.


